Homework

In 2020, we completed a comprehensive review of our homework practices. After listening to student, parent and teacher feedback and implementing changes, the data continues to who a particularly low rate of homework completion across the year groups. As such, we have agreed to set less and more openended tasks while reducing reliance on online platforms for the setting and completion of homework. However, Google Classroom may still be used at times. Therefore, Term 1 homework will be as follows:

- Home Reading & Log a minimum of 15 minutes sustained reading every day is hugely beneficial. Please prioritise this. Students will be given a reflection book to add to daily. Home readers may be used for some students this term, however most will be expected to read borrowed library books.
- Speaking and Listening Students are asked to prepare and present on a set topic every three weeks.
- Spelling Students are encouraged to access the Sound Waves website to practice their list words using the segmenting tool, then play other games related to the weekly phoneme.
- Mini projects these will be closely related to class learning. This term, there will be one set for weeks 3-6 and another set for weeks 7-10.

With regards to mathematics, data indicated that in 2020, use of Mathletics was not sufficient to justify the cost. Therefore, teachers will be providing a list of websites students can access to improve their mathematical fluency related to concepts being learned in class. Some to start with are:

Term 1 Learning Overview

English - Narrative

Speaking & Listening: Students will be learning how to orally tell a short story using changes in volume, pace and voice pitch to convey emotion. They will begin by practising the reading of a favourite picture book to a younger audience before moving to telling a 'yarn' to a small group. Reading: Student will be completing a detailed study on the reading strategies of predicting and visualising. Good readers predict before, during and after reading. They take clues from images, titles, events, individual words and text structures. An expert reader makes predictions with the intention or confirming or refining them. Visualising helps understand characters, events and settings. It is particularly useful when reading descriptive passages or detailed explanations of how events have taken place.

Writing: Students will be revising and building on their understanding of narrative structure. Quality story writing involves careful planning of events, as well as effective characterisation, meaning choosing what to describe about a character as to make the reader think or feel a certain way about them. Students will be learning how to write with varied punctuation using direct speech, noun groups, correct tense (past, present and future) and take paragraphs when the time, place or character changes. Spelling: We will begin our Sound Waves program for the year as per the following learning sequence:

Week 3 – 'b' as in balloon

Week 4 – 'a' as in apple

Week 5 – 'k' as in kite Week 6 - 'e' as in egg

Week 7 – 'd' as in duck

Week 8 - 'i' as in igloo

Week 9 - 'f' as in fish Week 10 – 'o' as in orange Handwriting:

Year 3 will revise basic letter formation and begin learning cursive entries.

Year 4 will revise cursive entries and exits and begin practicing fluency joins.

Mathematics

We will begin maths groups in Week 3. Each student will be placed in one of four groups. These groupings are flexible and students may move in and out of groups depending on their learning needs.

All groups will be broadly focusing on:

Whole Number: Using knowledge of place value to generate large or small numbers from given digits; relating addition and subtraction number facts; recalling multiplication facts of two, three, five and ten (Year 3) and up to 10 x 10 (Year 4); model and represent fractions up to fifths; and developing mental strategies for addition and subtraction

Measurement and Geometry: Use a ruler to measure and draw lines using cm and mm; tell the time to the minute using the terms 'past' and 'to'; using formal units to measure area (square cm or m)l using the litre as a unit for measuring capacity; and identifying and naming three-dimensional objects.

Statistics and Probability: Collecting data, organising it in categories and representing it in data displays.

History – First Contact

Students will be learning the reasons behind why the British chose to transport convicts on the First Fleet. The will examine first and second hand sources of information to learn about life in 18th Century England and the conditions that led to overcrowded prisons. Students will research the conditions experienced by those who sailed on the First Fleet and the struggles experienced on the journey to Australia.

<u>Science - Physical World Unit</u>

Students will be learning about forces and how they act on objects. Forces can either be contact (push, pull, friction, drag etc.) or non-contact (gravity, magnetism etc).

Personal Development – Does who I am affect who you are? Social and Emotional Key Competency -

Students will explore the concept of identity, exploring what this term means and the various aspects that define one's identity. They will explore their own and examine how to use strengths to positively contribute to their communities.

PE - Fundamental Movement Skills

Students will work towards mastering the skills of 'skip' and 'overarm through', and refine their ability to 'leap', 'kick', 'dodge' and perform a 'two-handed strike'

Creative Arts – Abstract Art interpretation and creation

Students will be engaging in a study of abstract art by observing common objects and representing them in their own creative ways. They will view and discuss artworks created by Piet Mondrian, Henri Matisse and Sonia Delaunay. In music, student will be learning about musical concepts with Mrs Munday through learning the recorder.

Routines

Self Awareness

In Term 1, Stage 2 teachers have decided to take on one key learning area that they are passionate about and teach it to all three classes on a rotating timetable. Mrs Druce will be teaching science, Miss Mills will be teaching History and Mr Davies will be teaching sport.
