Kiss and Ride' on Fairway's Avenue and Road Safety at the Crossing

The 'Kiss and Ride' zone is simply an area on Fairway's Avenue to drop off and pick up students. It is unnecessary to park and get out of the car. You should stop in the area, stay in your car, leave your engine running, and ensure that your child safely exits or enters on the kerb side of the car, then move off in a safe manner for all cars. If everyone follows this procedure then we'll avoid a build-up of traffic. Please do not drop off or pickup your child in the 'No Stopping' zone. Following these basic road rules helps to make our school a safer place for all. Rangers regularly patrol the area and issue hefty fines. Please stay vigilant at drop off and pick up times on Fairways Ave as you drive near the pedestrian crossing. Children especially our K-2 are a little hard to see when they use the crossing.

Parents are welcome to speak to staff on site between 8.30am and 9.00am and after 3.00pm each day. Please note that staff are involved in meetings at various times throughout the week. Whole staff meetings are held every Wednesday from 3.15pm onwards. What have 5/6S been up to?

As part of their Geography unit on poverty, 5/6S are learning about what life is like for those who live below the poverty line. This can be described as living on less than \$2.50 a day. After exploring some examples from around the world and within Australia, their task was to pretend to be a child living in poverty anywhere in the world by writing a journal entry describing a typical day. Here are some of their journal entries. Enjoy!

My Poverty Journal

I woke up hearing people fighting. I live in Singapore. My house is a slum. Our house is made of rusty old brown tin and metal. I've got to walk one kilometre to get water from the water well. There are holes in my house that make us cold and sick from the wind and breeze. For breakfast I had nothing, but I had to eat. I crept around our local food bank and snuck in the old rusty crevice. I got in and I quickly got a banana. Then I dashed, hoping no one saw me.

My life is very boring. I must work 48 Hours per week. I get 8 or 10 cents. For lunch I got nothing. My mother said that lunch is useless and that we should not waste food. My sister is sick. She got sick by eating an unclean apple, the apple was not edible. My brother helps our family buy catching critters such as caterpillars. My mum and dad helped build our house so we had shelter and a roof over my head. I'm very grateful for what I have. I get scared when people fight, they are always fighting about food and scraps. I have no friends. My mum helps me with my homework. I must do my homework on dirty ground. I hear people getting killed by guns from the war that we are facing. My mother snapped with anger and tears. She said only go with people you know you'll never know could hurt me. Our town shares the 4 goats for meat and milk.

Hi, my name is Ares.

Today I woke up on my little dirt pile. For breakfast I had a piece of mouldy bread. A few minutes went by, and my brother started vomiting up the piece of bread. Soon, I got my water bucket and went out to fill it up. After that I went to school. My teacher yelled at me for being late. I came from Greece but right now I live in Sydney with my little brother, my mom, and my dad. We are just recovering from a war

Every second Friday my parents get payed \$4.00 so I have to sometimes steal food.

After school I went back home to get my water bucket and fill it up with water at the water fountain. But when I was waiting in line, I saw some men pointing at me, I think they were some of the men I stole food from. I waited a bit nervously and after a while I walked. As I was walking the same men were following but this time sprinting at me. I ran for my life. I ended up in an alley way which was the wrong decision because it was dead end, and the men were now walking at me with death in their eyes. I was trapped, scared and hungry.

Dear Diary,

Today was quite rough. I awoke to my mother yelling at some dogs that had attempted to snatch our rations. "Snipes!" My mother would bark. I didn't like loud noises, it reminded me of the devastating war we were currently recovering from. Breakfast was cancelled due to losing too much food from the recent incident. I was used to this but it was the third time this week. Early in the afternoon and starving, my mother sent us to get food from the market with the little money she had worked for. The prices were high this time. My siblings and I had no other choice; I grabbed the bread and began to sprint towards the lonely alleyway that no one ever went near. Before I could reach the entrance, a masculine hand grabbed my forearm and I shrieked. In fact, it shocked me so much that I had dropped to the ground out of instinct. Upon realizing this, I scrambled for the now mud submerged bread, and as soon as I spotted it I pulled the bread towards my chest to somewhat protect it. I narrowed my eyes to face the stranger. He had a clean, kind face and a kept- freshly cut, beard. Straight away I knew he wasn't from around here but that wasn't my only thought. Quickly, I jumped to my feet and started to back up slowly. I thought he would attack me but he just stood there, idol, staring at me with eyes of sorrow and a glimpse of remorse. I didn't have time, so I attempted to pass him, but he had other plans. Before I knew it; I was back home, back on my tatty floor, back with my family. But this time I was fed, this time there were smiles. I was lucky to run into that man, he showed more than just public decency. Tonight, my family slept with full stomachs, and full hearts.

At the crack of dawn, I awaken my siblings, one an older brother named James and the other a little sister named Mary. I feel bad for Mary, she's a sweet little girl but hasn't had the sweetest life. Mary has had a cold for sixteen and a half weeks now. She was only 3 when our father died in war for our country and 5 when mum got framed for stealing \$500 worth of food. I really hope one day they find out who the real culprit is. Today is our day off for me and my brother. We work in a factory making \$3.75 a week. It's enough for the week right now but Mary's cold needs medicine so we must save 75c every week.

While I was at the shops getting food for the week, I noticed a TV in the window at the device store showing the weather. It was 39 degrees today (lucky I was wearing my torn shorts). After getting food for the week, I went back to our home in an alley with us at the end. It's tough but I think I'll survive... hopefully.

Eligibility

Children are eligible to apply to attend an Early Intervention (EI) Preschool class one to two years prior to the year they start Kindergarten. The child should be enrolled in a Preschool to apply for EI services.

The child must have at least one diagnosed disability to apply (e.g. ASD, Severe Expressive/Receptive Language Delay, Intellectual Disability etc).

Some children may be eligible to apply for alternative DoE class placements and services. These options will be discussed once eligibility is determined and may include:

- Placement in a School for Specific Purposes (SSP) class may be more appropriate for children with significant needs (including a severe or moderate intellectual disability). Applications for SSP settings can be made when eligible children reach 4 years old.
- Itinerant Support Teacher-Hearing and Itinerant Support Teacher-Vision services.

Early Intervention - Session

There are EI classes at John Palmer PS, Kingswood South PS, Mount Druitt PS, Pendle Hill PS, Whalan PS, Windsor South PS and Yates Ave PS. The classes are known as *Early Intervention - Session*.

Days and times vary for each class. There are generally two classes each with up to 5 - 8 students. They could be one, two or three day classes depending up one what the school offers and are usually half day classes. Parents are not able to request particular days.

There is an EI Teacher and a full time School Learning Support Officer (SLSO) who work with the class on a Preschool program and preparation for school.

Parents drop off and collect their children from EI Session. Assisted Student Transport to and from the class is available for families who are eligible and is applied for at a later date by the EI Teacher. More information on the assisted school travel program, including eligibility requirements can be found at <https://education.nsw.gov.au/astp>

A review meeting is held with the EI teacher, School Counsellor, and parents during the year. Assessments and recommendations for school placement are discussed at the meeting.

Early Intervention - Resource Support

Early Intervention Resource Support involves the EI Teacher visiting the child's Preschool once a fortnight in the afternoon. The EI Teacher assists the Preschool to develop and implement strategies to support the student's transition to school and makes recommendations for appropriate Kindergarten class placement. Resource support can alternatively be offered as a support playgroup as at Kingswood South and Mt Druitt PS.

A review meeting is held with the EI Teacher, School Counsellor, and parents during the year. Recommendations for school placement are discussed at the meeting.

If you've heard the expression "It's only a matter of time until someone gets hurt" then you understand why it is important for everyone to obey the road rules.

A child hit at an impact speed of 30km/hr has a 99% chance of surviving. At 70km/hr the chance of survival is less than 7%.

What does this mean?

You cannot stop in this area for any reason.

Why is it there?

To keep sight distance clear for drivers, children & other pedestrians to avoid crashes.



What does this mean?

You cannot stop or park in a bus zone unless you are driving a bus.

Why is it there?

To provide a safe place for buses to set down & pick up passengers



What does this mean?

You can stop in this area to drop off or pick up passengers for a maximum of 2 minutes. You must stay within 3 metres of your vehicle.

Why is it there?

To provide safe places for children to be picked up - usually associated with Kiss & Ride zones.



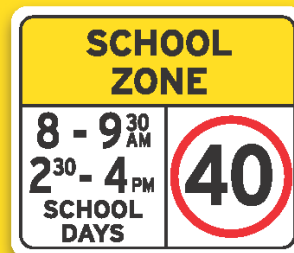
40 km/hr School Zones are provided to increase the safety of all pedestrians, but especially children, who are walking in the vicinity of schools. Obey the limit and be aware of the time of day.



Parking on footpaths/nature strips is an offence - fines can be issued that include the loss of 2 demerit points.

SCHOOL ZONE OFFENCES



Children and young people are extremely vulnerable in the road environment. They need you to take extra care when driving and parking around schools. Penalties are greater for breaking the road rules in a school zone. Please choose safety over convenience.



No Parking

You have 2 minutes to drop-off or pick-up passengers, staying within 3 metres of your vehicle. Your vehicle must not block the flow of traffic or become a danger to other road users.



Mobile Phone Use

You must not use a hand held mobile phone while driving.



No Stopping

You must not stop at any point on the road or kerb in the direction of the arrow.

You must not stop on or within 20 metres of an intersection.



Bus Zone

You must not stop in a Bus Zone unless you are driving a bus.



Driveways

You must not stop on or across a driveway.



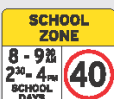
Pedestrian Crossings

You must not stop or park on or near a marked crossing.



Double Parking

You must not park alongside another parked vehicle.



School Zone Speeding Offences

40km/h is the speed limit. Children are vulnerable in school zones.



Seatbelts

The driver and all passengers must wear a seatbelt or correctly fitted child restraint.

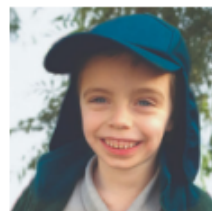
